Activities:

Make-a-Pig Flannel – make the different body parts of a pig out of felt (head, body, feet, etc...) and throw in a couple other animals' body parts too! Build a pig together as a group with your kids using their vocabulary to describe what body parts need to be added to the board and where they go. Pig Tails Color Sorting – make simple pig bottoms out of various colored paper, add rice or another sensory item to a bin along with several curled pipe cleaners that match your pigs. Add some tweezers and have kids dig out the tails to match to the pig! Found at the <u>Modern</u> <u>Preschool</u> blog.

Muddy Pigs – Glue a pig to some construction paper and let the kids use brown paint with their fingers, paintbrushes or cotton swabs to make him muddy! Source: <u>Pinterest</u>
